All three of those established Skoda stars would have had their feathers distinctly ruffled had the Skoda UK entry of Andreas Mikkelsen enjoyed a free run. While his pace on gravel has already been proven, the young Norwegian had yet to come to the fore on sealed surfaces, but Zlin marked a major breakthrough for the prospective Volkswagen prodigy. Mikkelsen ran a close second to Kopecký through most of Saturday, until a rear puncture on SS8 and a spin on SS9, Saturday's finale, wrecked his chances, but he was happy with his surge in Tarmac performance.

"This is Jan's home rally. He knows the roads very well and he's definitely not slow here, so to be able to battle with him is very pleasing," said Mikkelsen. Four stage wins out of six on Sunday proved his opening-day form was no fluke, and he came unjust six seconds short of reclaiming fourth from Thierry Neuville.

Indeed, Neuville's fourth-taken despite clouting some small trees on Saturday after a frightening sixth-gear off -was as good as it got for Peugeot, after a disastrous rally RESULTS

We took hard tyres for the afternoon but with cuts at the rear as we heard it was going to rain," said Wilks, who fell back to 12th as a result. "The car was moving around too much and I was pushing too much to make up for the lost time, slid wide and hit some bushes. We had to drive

Wilks fought gamely on Sunday morning to get himself back into the points, and got as far as eighth until a snapped alternator belt puthimout on SS13.

Of the rest, Craig Breen was the stand-out star. The Irishman put in a faultless run to finish seventh overall in his Ford Fiesta S2000, just behind Toni Gardemeister, who was hampered by a brace of clutch failures. Robert Barrable finished 13th, but was later excluded for a timecard error.
